Frequently Asked Questions

Who are Unaccompanied Homeless Youth?

Unaccompanied homeless youth are young people who lack safe, stable housing and who are not in the care of a parent or guardian. They may have run away from home or been forced to leave by their parents. Unaccompanied youth live in a variety of temporary situations, including shelters, the homes of friends or relatives, cars, campgrounds, public parks, abandoned buildings, motels, and bus or train stations.

Generally, youth leave home due to severe dysfunction in their families, including circumstances that put their safety and well-being at risk. Unfortunately, physical and sexual abuse in the home is common. Unaccompanied youth do not receive financial support from their parents and do not have access to parental information.

Who are School District Liaisons?

Every school district is required to designate a liaison for students experiencing homelessness. Homeless liaisons have a number of legal responsibilities, including identifying youth who meet the definition of homeless and are unaccompanied.
