Foster-Johnson Health Center Ebola Protocol

1. Student Health Center (SHC) staff will closely monitor individuals who present with fever, headache, joint and muscle aches, weakness, fatigue, diarrhea, vomiting, stomach pain and lack of appetite and in some cases bleeding; who have also recently traveled to West Africa (Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Senegal, Nigeria or other countries where Ebola transmission has been reported by WHO-World Health Organization) within 21 days (3 weeks) of symptom onset (EVD Awareness for Emergency Medical Services).
2. SHC staff will follow and implement the "Detailed Emergency Medical Services Checklist for Ebola Preparedness."
3. Any suspected cases of Ebola will be reported to the receiving facility, Local and State Public Health Authorities and the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).
4. University officials will be notified of any suspected cases of Ebola.
5. SHC staff will continue to monitor CDC for updates and alerts.
6. Information detailing the signs and symptoms of Ebola will be given to the International Affairs office for dissemination to students returning from the targeted countries, prior to each semester.
7. The Health Center webpage will include pertinent information for students regarding the signs/symptoms and transmission of Ebola.

EBOLA IS REAL
The Ebola virus causes a severe, often fatal illness. People who seek treatment early have a better chance of survival.

Guinea	16 million
Sierra Leone	8.5 million
Liberia	4.963 million

2014's outbreak has been the most severe ever, both in terms of number of cases and fatalities, but with a survival rate of around 50%.

EBOLA CAN SPREAD
The virus spreads through...

- Fluid that has been taken by an infected animal
- Direct contact with an infected or recently recovered individual
- Contact with infected people or animals
- Infected medical equipment, used needles, or syringes
- Infected blood and other bodily fluids

EBOLA SYMPTOMS
Fever 50-90%
Sore throat, muscle aches, headache, diarrhea, vomiting, skin rash, darkening of the skin

EBOLA PREVENTION
Health workers must wear proper protective clothing
People must fight mosquitoes by spraying the trash about their house
Go to a health facility as soon as you have any symptoms



Charles M. Blow – Author/Visual Op-Ed Columnist



Charles M. Blow is The New York Times's visual Op-Ed columnist. His column appears on Monday and Thursday. Blow joined The New York Times in 1994 as a graphics editor and quickly became the paper's graphics director. The youngest department head in the paper's history, a position he held for nine years. In that role, he led The Times to a best of show award from the Society of News Design for the Times's information graphics coverage of 9/11, the first time the award had been given for graphics coverage. He also led the paper to its first two best in show awards from the Malofiej International Infographics Summit for work that included coverage of the Iraq war. Blow went on to become the paper's Design Director for News before leaving in 2006 to become the Art Director of National Geographic Magazine. Before coming to The Times, Mr. Blow had been a graphic artist at The Detroit News.
