


50K of the Greatest Hands

The determination of one of GSU's fall 2013valedictorians continues, as he strives for academic and career success. Mr. Landry Kopdjous, a College of Business alum, graduated with a B.S. degree in accounting in fall 2013 with a cumulative GPA of 4.0. His accomplishments didn't stop there, whereas Kopdjous began to prepare for the CPA exam upon graduation and has successfully passed the exam this fall. The Uniform CPA Examination is a professional licensing examination used by all state accountancy boards to ensure CPA applicants possess at least a threshold mastery of technical knowledge needed to enter the CPA profession.

Kopdjous' work ethic not only helped him to pass the exam successfully, but it helped him to pass the exam on the first try. In addition, Kopdjous is currently pursuing his master's degree in Master of Professional Accountancy at Louisiana Tech University. During the summer of 2015 he will have an internship with PricewaterhouseCooper (PwC), a firm that offers auditing, accounting, and assurance services. In the fall of 2015 he will hold a full-time position as an auditor with Deloitte.
