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<u>Course Description:</u> This course introduces the basic principles, methods, aims, and materials of geography; the elements and patterns of social geography applied to an analysis of human affairs in certain nations and regions of the world.

Topics covered include <u>Historical Geography Fundamentals related areas</u>. These areas include People and their environment, Cultural bias, Human Geography/Human Terrain Analysis/Socio-Cultural Analysis, Know the various types of human geography type projects, Human Geography and the intelligence community and impacts of human geography & policy. These topics are aligned with **NGA's Knowledge Unit Topics and learning objectives VIII.1D1-VIII.1D7**.

Topics covered in this course are related to <u>Cultural/Regional Expertise areas</u>. These topics include Impacts of human geography issues, Human population characteristics and distribution, material and non-material cultures, acculturation/assimilation/globalization, Religion/creed/values/norms, concepts of social identity, cultural political organization, population demography/migration, demographic transition model and epidemiologic transition model. **Learning objectives addressed are VIII2D1-VIII.2D22**.

This course also addresses learning objectives that are linked to <u>Human Geography Data</u> <u>Foundation and Management</u>. Topics covered include Human Geography data & sources, Assessment of Human Geography/standards/metadata, data schema, and data enhancement. Learning objectives **VIII.3D1-VIII.3D14** are linked to course content.

Course objectives and Corresponding Program outcomes

This course will introduce students to basic methods and concepts of modern Geography. Students will gain an understanding of the principle traditions, thought, and perspectives of geography, through exposure to print and electronically based research (i.e. Internet) At the end of the semester the student should be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of Geography and the relationship between Physical Geography and Human Geography.
- Demonstrate theoretical and practical concepts associated with the techniques and skills of reading and interpreting different types of maps
- Describe the differences and the similarities in the design and purpose of Geographical Tools: Remote Sensing, Information Systems (GIS) and Remote

- Sensing.
- Demonstrate a working knowledge, regional concept and different types of regions.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the characteristics, location and functions some of the major cities in the world (Urban Geography)
- Analyze facts about Population Geography, Geography of Language, Religion, Identity, Development, and Political Geography.
- Exhibit an understanding of Agricultural Geographies and Changing Geographies of Industry and services.
- Describe the relationship between man and his environment (nature) and the impact of human activities on the physical environment (environmental challenges)
