The Solution


- Empowering communities and teaching residents to grow their own food is one of the most direct solutions. Showing these communities how easy getting started can be is one of the most empowering tools we have.

 Not only were students and adults encouraged to participate but the younger generation were involved with creating signs and crafts to raise awareness of issues.




"Leadership Skills"
