

History of the Honors College

The Honors College was established in 1990 in response to a verbal directive from the third president of Grambling State University, Dr. Joseph B. Johnson. President Johnson selected Dr. Helen L. Richards-Smith to plan and implement the Earl Lester Cole Honors College with the designated title of Associate Dean of Academic Administration and Director of the Honors College. The assignment was given, fall 1989; the Inauguration was held Fall 1990. After the Honors College was established, Dr. Helen Richards-Smith became the first Dean of the Honors College. In 1991, Dr. Ellen D. Smiley was selected to assist Dr. Richards-Smith with strengthening the Honors College. The Honors College was chiefly funded through Title III and soon became institutionalized throughout the university. When she retired, Dr. Richards-Smith was named Dean Emeritus of the Honors College. Dr. Ellen D. Smiley is currently serving as the second Dean to lead the Earl Lester Cole Honors College.

Dr. Earl Lester Cole served Grambling State University for over forty-one years. Grambling State University was honored and given due deference to the distinguished scholar, educator, administrator, gentleman and humanitarian by naming the Honors College, The Earl Lester Cole Honors College. Dr. Cole's career and legacy set the standards by which others were measured.

Undergraduate students who have an overall grade point average of 3.5 or above and who have the ability to successfully complete 3 honors college seminar classes excluding HON 110 are eligible to apply for induction. At the level of induction, students are given the honors college badge (pin).

In 2015 Prentiss Smiley, then president of the Earl Lester Cole Honors College Student Organization, led an initiative that supported senior members of the Honors College who qualified to receive the Scholars' Jacket. Thus, seniors who are members of the honors college who maintain an overall grade point average of 3.5 or above, complete 3 honors college seminar classes excluding HON 110 and are in good standing with the University receive the scholars' jacket. Smiley, who had played football in junior high and high school recognized that athletes are awarded with shirts and letterman jackets for their success and recognized throughout the campus. His concept was to bring greater recognition to students who achieved greatness in the world of academe scholastically. He referred to these students as being "academically nasty", a phrase that he coined from one of his mentors, Dr. Ronnie L. Davis. Academically nasty means that the student works hard in the classroom and is committed to learning and studying in order to move to the next level.

Finally, at graduation, members of the Honors College who have maintained an overall grade point average of 3.5 or above, completed 3 honors college seminar classes excluding HON 110 and are in good standing with the University receive the Honors College Medallion of Distinction. The levels are gold, silver, or bronze depending on the level of engagement (service) and overall grade point average.



Dr. Earl Lester Cole

Former Vice President for Whom the Honors College is Named

Dr. Earl Lester Cole was one of the great pioneers whose exemplary years of service as an educator at Grambling State University spanned nearly half a century. Earl Lester Cole's tenure at Grambling began in 1936 as a science teacher; advancing through the ranks of the faculty, becoming dean in 1946 and was appointed vice president in 1969.

"Dean Cole" as he was affectionately called even after assuming the vice-presidency, can be remembered for his active involvement in implementing curriculum which is considered to be the cornerstone to courses now being offered at Grambling State University. Even after his retirement in 1977, Earl Lester Cole continued to advise members of the faculty and administrators.



Dean Cole was highly respected by his former colleagues and students and is described as a true professional, a good administrator, and a truly outstanding man who is credited for the positive influence in the educational advancement of his former students. Honesty and a fullness of integrity were accolades from those who knew him well. Over the years, he had been recognized for his numerous contributions to Grambling, culminating in the naming of the university's honors college, the Earl Lester Cole Honors College.

His influential involvement in the community brought several businesses to the university and as an active member of New Rocky Valley Baptist Church, "Dean Cole" was instrumental in the construction of a building for the church.

Earl Lester Cole succumbed after a prolonged illness at the age of 89. He can be remembered as a man who gave much to the field of higher education at a historically black university, always exuded a commanding presence during his lifetime.

Julian Green, at 53, holds more than 25 years of experience in corporate and crisis communications, media relations, governmental affairs, corporate social responsibility and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Currently Green serves as senior vice president of communications and community affairs for the Chicago Cubs. Green is the ballclub's chief spokesperson and responsible for leading baseball and business communications and helps direct the ballclub's community outreach.

Previously, Green served as the director of media relations for MillerCoors where he was the chief spokesperson for the company's operations in the United States and Puerto Rico. Green was also responsible for directing the company's corporate communications activities including media relations, executive communications, investor communications, crisis communications, corporate social responsibility communications and managing the company's corporate website and social media platforms. Prior to that role, Green served as press secretary to then United States Senator Barack Obama handling primary spokesperson duties and facilitating a barrage of local, national and international media requests for Mr. Obama. Mr. Green first joined Obama during his historic campaign for the United States Senate in May 2004, where he served in the same capacity as the senator's primary

Green served as the director of communications and marketing for the Chicago Park District overseeing media relations and the park system's marketing assets. As the director, Green was a senior advisor to the chief executive officer and led communication and marketing activities for the District's 552 parks, 33 beaches, nine museums, 16 historic lagoons and two world-class conservatories. Green was also responsible for developing and executing the media strategy for the renovation of Soldier Field, which generated countless local and national media coverage from Chicago to San Diego.

In 2003, Green was appointed deputy campaign manager and communications director for Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley's re-election effort. That year the Mayor received the highest percentage of votes ever in his 14-year tenure. Prior to the Mayor's 2003 re-election campaign, Green served as assistant press secretary to the Mayor, where he coordinated Mayoral press conferences, local and national media interviews, provided counsel to city heads and agencies, managed crisis and developed public awareness campaigns. Green's primary duty was speech writing for the Mayor on a variety of subjects from healthcare to advocacy programs for the homeless. Prior to the Mayor's office, Green was a senior account executive at Ogilvy Public Relations Worldwide, where his focus was corporate and brand communications. Before joining Ogilvy PR, Green was an account coordinator at Fleishman-Hillard International Communications in Chicago.

Currently, Green serves as president and board member of the Pullman Community Center in Chicago. He also serves on the advisory board of the Support Group and previously served as chairman, founded by NBA great Tim Hardaway and Bennie Henry. Previously, he served as interim board member of the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority, which oversees Navy Pier and McCormick Place. Green received his bachelor's degree from Alabama A&M University's School of Mass Communication with a specialization in Radio Film and Television Broadcast.
